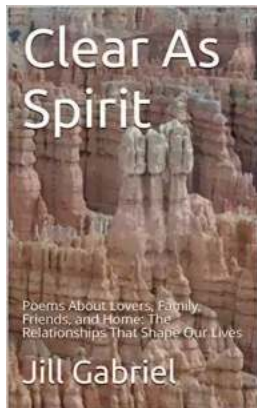

the case with many surviving diaries, pages were rolled up and inserted into bottles, which were then hidden in the earth.

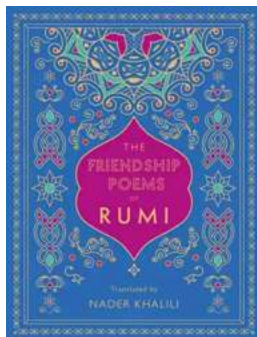
"Staying Alive" is one such set of rolled up pages that escaped destruction and survived in a bottle so that we can read it. This diary was translated from its original Polish into English.

This is book number five in the Amy Cravitz Auschwitz diary collection.



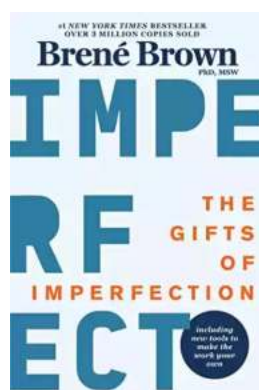
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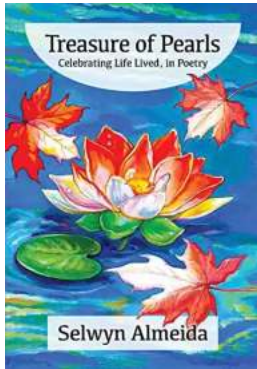
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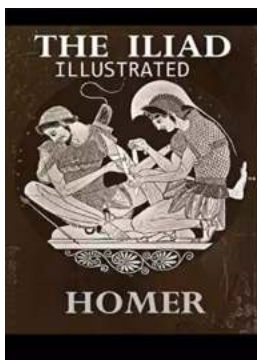
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
